It was a real joy to see the students back last Monday. They were pleased to see their classmates and lunchtime was interesting to watch as many of them sat and chatted rather than running around in games. We want to take this opportunity to thank our whānau for the support over the last two months. Home learning was a new experience for all of us and a very steep learning curve. The analogy of "building the aeroplane in flight" comes to mind, and thankfully we negotiated that time without carnage! Teachers are doing a debrief and collating our thoughts around what we learnt about Home / Online Learning. What we have discovered is that some students thrived in that environment of autonomous learning although not everyone. The challenge for us is to ensure all learners needs are met through a combination of total autonomy and teacher direction.

We have been accredited as a Licenced Award Unit for the Duke of Edinburgh Awards. I gave a presentation at Mondays Assembly for students fourteen years of age and above, outlining how the programme works and how to get involved. We are very motivated to get many students started on the Bronze Award. It is our belief that many of the current activities, sports and recreational pursuits students currently do will fit various award category criteria. Students that showed interest have taken a brochure and instructions on how to register.

We should always remember them and their efforts!!

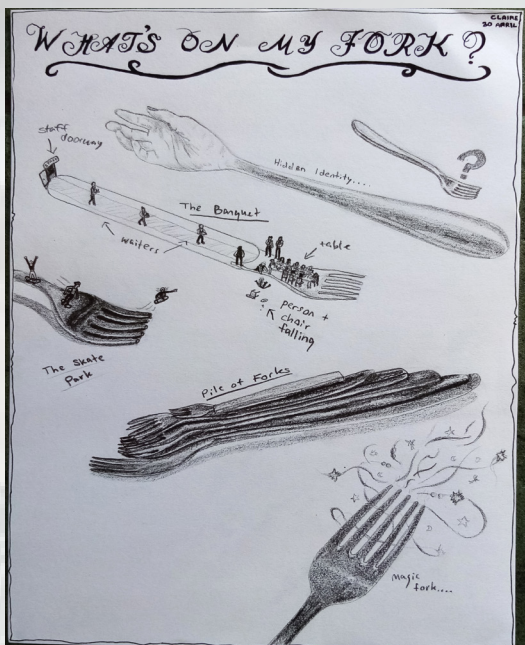
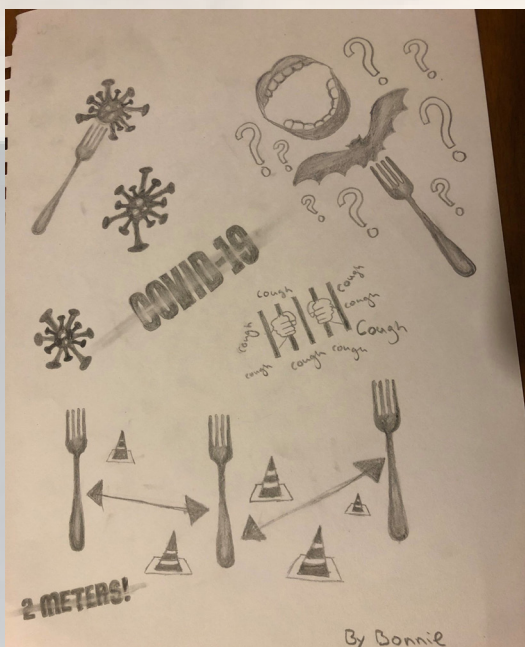
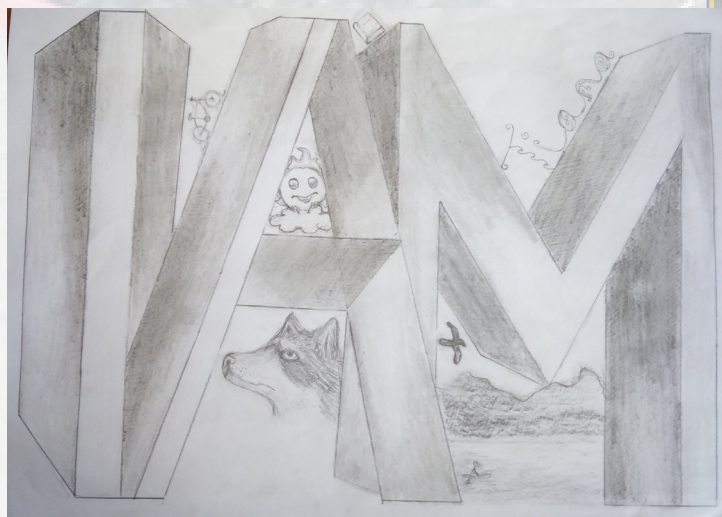

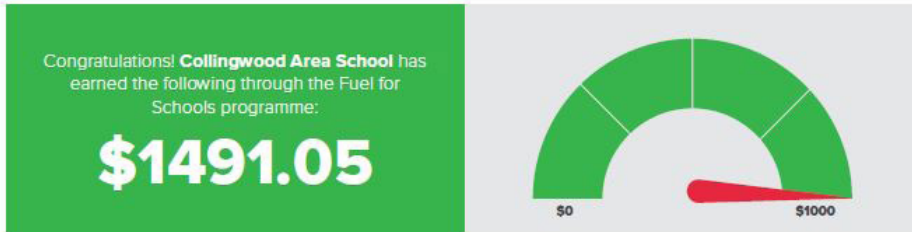


Confidential Free Service
