BoT Spot

An update from the board on some recent governance achievements and plans for 2021.

Firstly we have recently completed a **comprehensive review of the [Child Protection Policy](#)**, this is one, if not the most important policy for schools – ensuring all tamariki are safe and provides support to all staff on how to identify and manage situations. We'd like to acknowledge the combined efforts of Joyce, Elizabeth and Hugh on the many hours of ground work developing this policy.

We'd also like to **thank all the whānau who attended our recent session with WSP architects** presenting the latest plans (in 3D virtual reality) and progress on the school rebuild project. We are now working into the Developed design phase of the project where the overall building design is further developed into specifications and internal spaces are developed to the next level of detail. This enables the project to start working through the building consent processes with the council in preparation to hopefully start some of the construction phase by the summer holidays.

Finally we'd like to share an **overview of the Boards workplan for 2021** – this is not a finite list, but highlights a timeline guide when work will commence on various governance aspects. We hope this will help give greater transparency to our school community and help to enable appropriate feedback to the school management and Board. Alongside this we'd like to remind everyone that you are welcome to attend Board meetings as an observer, as they are meetings held in public. We also include copies of the minutes available on the school website.

I'm in Whakapapa tonight, heading to do the Tongariro crossing tomorrow, and the weather is looking great.

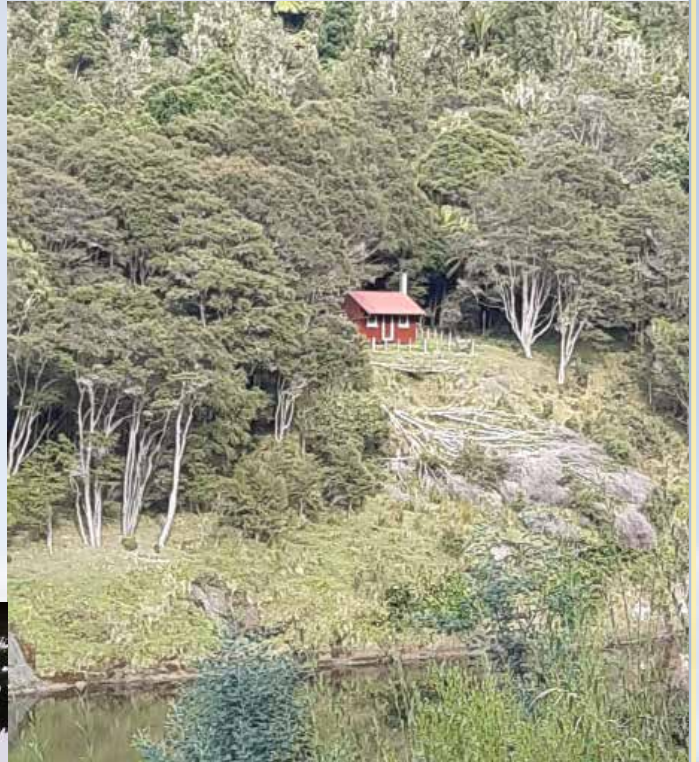

BE A GUARDIAN OF THE FUTURE

Aged 15-30? Get immunised against measles to protect your whānau, community and future generations from harm. It's free at GPs and participating pharmacies.

Measles is a serious disease that can make you very sick. It's about 8 times more contagious than COVID-19 so spreads fast.

Getting immunised is the best way to protect you, your whānau and community from catching and spreading measles.

Not sure if you're already immunised against measles? Lots of people aged between 15 and 30 years didn't get fully immunised when they were children. This puts you at risk of catching and spreading measles.

Ask your doctor, parent or caregiver if you had two doses of the MMR vaccine as a child. If you don't know, it's best to get immunised. It's safe to have an extra dose of the MMR vaccine.
