Kia ora,

My name is Brendan Richards, and at January meeting of board of trustees (BOT) I was elected chairperson (presiding member) for the 2023 year. This is a role that I don't take lightly, and I am committed to doing it to the best of my ability. Dan Jessep has accepted the role of vice chair and I am really looking forward to leaning on Dan's skillset and values this year. At our first meeting, we also welcomed Rosie Riley as our new parent representative.

I am so excited to lead such a talented and convicted group of people; each person bringing different life experiences and diversity of thought to board discussions. However, everyone comes to the board table with a common purpose; to ensure all students receive the best possible educational outcomes in a safe and inclusive environment, that gives effect to Te Tiriti o Waitangi. I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow trustees for taking time out of their busy lives to make a real difference for our kura; and putting our akonga (students) at the centre of every decision that is made.

Throughout our first two meetings of 2023 we have agreed on our code of conduct, board processes and board culture. We have also had discussions on how we are going to interact and communicate with our stakeholders. Your BOT of 2023 has a renewed focus on being transparent and accountable in how we govern your school. We want you to know what the BOT is doing and how the school is progressing. It is so important that all of the decisions made at the board table align with the aspirations and wishes of our wider school community. Communication is a two-way process so please engage with us and give honest and constructive feedback.

A fair chunk of our board communications will come via Kaye Stark our board secretary. I've had the privilege of working alongside Kaye for ten months now. Kaye plays such an important part across both the management and governance platforms of our school. She is so detailed and thorough, and is committed to doing everything she does to 'best practice' standards. I would have had hesitations taking on the chair role if I didn't have someone as capable as Kaye on our team.

I'm also extremely thankful to Hugh, the tumaki of our school, for his respect of the current board and his receptiveness to working with a BOT that wants to get involved and challenge the status quo. Myself and Hugh have had many conversations on the increased alignment between management and governance that this board seeks. I just want to make one thing clear though; Hugh is the leader of our school and he has complete freedom and discretion to run the school as he decides, as long as it aligns with the board's strategic plan and policy framework. A well functioning board and principal relationship is essential in achieving exciting and brave outcomes for our kura.

#### A few other areas of clarification;

Policy Review Cycle; the board has overhauled is policy review cycle and is using 'School Docs' as a platform for our review with each policy reviewed every three years. Kaye communicated this in the last flyer and will continue to report on this during the year. This term we have had a primary focus on Health and Safety Management and Reporting. Term 2 will have a focus on Education Outside the Classroom and Behaviour Management. Please take the opportunity to read these policies and give feedback.

**Meeting dates and protocol**; I have received some feedback on how we communicate board meeting dates; we will make some changes to ensure we get better saturation with our communication on this. Our next meeting date is 27th of March and we will not be having a formal meeting in April due to school


holidays. All meetings are in the school staffroom starting at 3.30pm. A board meeting is held in a public place but it actually isn't a public meeting. You are welcomed and encouraged to attend the meetings to observe. If you want to speak at a board meeting you will have to request speaking rights in advance of the meeting.

Concerns and Complaints Policy; This is probably the policy that is most misunderstood within our school community. There is a very defined and prescriptive process in how concerns (which may escalate to a complaint) are dealt with within our school. You have mine and Hugh's assurances that all concerns and complaints will be taken seriously. Please refer to the flowchart that is included in this flyer to understand the processes behind this. For more information please refer to either our SchoolDocs on the School Website.

**Values and Revisioning**; The board is nearly at a stage to send out a draft position on where we are at with the revisioning and values work that we commissioned during the middle of last year. We will be seeking final feedback on this so please engage with this process. This is such an important piece of work in setting our school's direction and purpose and agreeing on the values we stand for as a school. Separate communications to come out on this before end of March. Exciting!!

**Resignation of Mrs Alison Menary**; Finally I would like to finish this correspondence by acknowledging the recent retirement of our Deputy Principal Mrs Alison Menary. Mrs Menary gave 33 years of service to our school, for the betterment of hundreds and hundereds of students that have received their education at CAS during this time. The board thanks Alison for the commitment, loyalty and leadership that underpinned everything she did. Without a doubt, our kura is in a better place because of your good works. We wish Alison all the best over the coming months as she fights her latest health battle.

On **DigitalNZ** you can discover more than 30 million digital items from more than 200 organisations on any topic, all for free. You'll find: videos - newspapers - maps - photographs - audio recordings - artworks - news reports.


