Term One is always a tad frenetic and we made a conscious decision to run nearly all residential Camps in this term which had added to the mix. Hopefully this takes the heat off of Term Four and I know we are all looking forward to focused and settled learning particularly for our NCEA students in Term 2.

We are lucky with our unique setting to provide these opportunities for tuakana teina, so our juniors can watch, learn and practice what they see from our senior athletes as they compete and draw inspiration from their achievements. The day concluded with the relay races with Wai winning both the 100m and 300m Whānau races and the senior students once again beating both the parents relay team and the teachers.

Thanks to Luke for the last minute call up to come and get the field ready and to Miriam and Lofty for helping him out, you did an awesome job. Thanks also to all the staff for helping out at the stations, recording results, taking photos, providing First Aid and helping students get to where they needed to be. The day wouldn't be possible without all of you.

There was some very close results and a few records broken:

Aaron Lockwood broke his own Junior Boys Javelin record that he set last year throwing 15.8m. He also broke the 800m record set by Logan Ricketts last year coming in at 3:23.

Isla Foulds tied Bianca Honey's Intermediate girls 400m record and broke her own 1500m record coming in at 6:33.

It was a big day on the 1500m track with Aonghus Garbutt breaking Jesse Gray and Thorin McQueen's Intermediate boys record, sneaking in one second faster at 6:27.

The most impressive record of the day also came on the 1500m track, set by Thorin McQueen. He smashed Dallas Erb's 6:35 record set back in 2018, crossing the finish line at 6:03!

## Year Four and Five Pohara Camp


Last week 23 Year Four and Five students from Te Kōrari and Te Puawai enjoyed three days of local outdoor exploration at our combined class camp.


