As with all our school wide events, we aim to have high participation and allow those who want to be competitive, to do so. Monday reached that goal with winners celebrated later in the Flyer. Jonny and Rosie had an enjoyable three days introducing our Year 4 students to their first residential camping experience at Pohara, the week before Mels room enjoyed three nights at glorious Totaranui and were joined for a day with Kims Year 7/8 group to walk to Mutton Cove as part of their William Pike Challenge.

Once the fog lifted each day in the Rai Valley, our TOSI team enjoyed glorious sunshine! Again the attitude of our tamariki cannot be faulted both on and off the sports field. Coming second by only a few points is highly commendable. The whangaunatanga among this group is what makes CAS pretty special! 1. Administration: The roof is fitted and the building water tight with windows and doors also fitted. Sub contractors are fitting out the interior with Plumbers, Electricians and Gib Fixers .

2. Technology: Windows and doors are due and the extraction system almost complete. Joinery is ordered and should be on site soon.

3. Teaching and learning: The LVL (Laminated Veneer Lumber) are about 1/3 of the way through being fitted and gives us a good insite to the shape and size of the final building .

Suffice to say we are all looking forward to good break. Term One is always a tad frenetic and we made a conscious decision to run nearly all residential Camps in this term which had added to the mix. Hopefully this takes the heat off of Term Four and I know we are all looking forward to focused and settled learning particularly for our NCEA students in Term 2.

## Athletics

Collingwood turned it on with a great day for our 2023 whole school Athletics. It was great to see all of the students giving it a go and cheering each other on. We are lucky with our unique setting to provide these opportunities for tuakana teina, so our juniors can watch, learn and practice what they see from our senior athletes as they compete and draw inspiration from their achievements. The day concluded with the relay races with Wai winning both the 100m and 300m Whānau races and the senior students once again beating both the parents relay team and the teachers.

Thanks to Luke for the last minute call up to come and get the field ready and to Miriam and Lofty for helping him out, you did an awesome job. Thanks also to all the staff for helping out at the stations, recording results, taking photos, providing First Aid and helping students get to where they needed to be. The day wouldn't be possible without all of you.

There was some very close results and a few records broken:

Aaron Lockwood broke his own Junior Boys Javelin record that he set last year throwing 15.8m. He also broke the 800m record set by Logan Ricketts last year coming in at 3:23.

Isla Foulds tied Bianca Honey's Intermediate girls 400m record and broke her own 1500m record coming in at 6:33.

It was a big day on the 1500m track with Aonghus Garbutt breaking Jesse Gray and Thorin McQueen's Intermediate boys record, sneaking in one second faster at 6:27.

The most impressive record of the day also came on the 1500m track, set by Thorin McQueen. He smashed Dallas Erb's 6:35 record set back in 2018, crossing the finish line at 6:03!
