After the holidays they will begin a short competition round over the hill. Best of luck girls, you're so inspiring!










Library News


Some of our many new, shiny, fabulous new books in the Library.

She chooses three boys and an orphan girl Aria, who will only go with her if she can bring her smelly dog. She overcomes some big challenges so there are some good values to discuss here, plus some clear imaginative exploration of each of the star clusters. We all love a good legend and this is a great read aloud to older primary children and for adults to learn more about Matariki. An authentic variation to the many Matariki books we have in our library. A beautiful hardback book that is a finalist in the 2023 New Zealand Book Awards For Children & Young Adults.

This story is about the scarf Violet knitted and sent away as a 'gift for soldiers.' This is an extraordinary World War 1 true story of two New Zealand siblings and a scarf. Quite a moving and uplifting story, We have a knitted scarf to accompany the book that copies the wool and style that the scarf was knitted in.
