Hillary Challenge

At the beginning of Term Two, Aonghus and I were given the opportunity to join the Golden Bay High School Adventure Racing Team traveling down to Christchurch for the Hillary challenge.

We departed from Tākaka on May 4th at 10:15am for our grueling six and a half hour drive down to Christchurch. We made a couple stops on the way but finally at 5:40pm we reached the campground we'd be staying at and got some rest before the massive day ahead of us.

The next day the actual race began. We met at the start at 9am - it was freezing! Our race began at Woodend Beach domain with a Rogaine and we had to collect 12 markers that had been scattered around the forest. We managed to collect all 12 in 35 minutes before we ran back to our bikes and began the 5 kilometre bike to our second rogaine.

This had 16 markers to find and record, we managed to get all of them in 48 minutes, we returned to the bike drop off and got started on our second and final bike ride which lasted over 2 and a half hours and was 25 kilometers long. We had to collect words on that bike ride for a word find at our the of the final leg and we managed to get all 16 words and earn the max amount of points for this word find.

We then began our final Rogaine with 40 minutes to collect over 20 markers so we went in a square and collected 12 closest ones to not risk being late and losing points which could make or break everything. We ended our race with 8 minutes to spare, we watched as the other teams arrived. As the final team came in, they announced the places. Out of all 16 teams that were doing the Hillary challenge this year, we placed 9th. Aonghus and I would like to thank GBHS, especially Fleur and Daphne, for giving us the opportunity to join them for this amazing event!

Top runners from each group will represent CAS at the GB Interschools' Cross Country (Held at CAS) on Friday 14th June.


