'Shipping' - A concerning trend

We wanted to bring to your attention a concerning trend that has recently come to light involving the use of social media platforms, particularly TikTok. The trend, known as "shipping," involves photos of students being matched with other students, often without their knowledge or consent, and shared online for others to comment on whether they would make a good couple – commonly using terms like "ship" (approve) or "dip" (disapprove). While this may appear light-hearted to some, it raises significant concerns around privacy, consent, and online safety.

We encourage parents and caregivers to have a timely conversation with their tamariki about respectful and sensible social media use. In particular, discussing the importance of not sharing photos or personal content of others without permission is vital in helping our young people understand the impact of their digital behaviour. We will also be speaking with our older students at kura about this issue to raise awareness and reinforce our expectations around respectful online conduct. If you have any questions or would like to discuss this further, please don't hesitate to get in touch.






Library News

It has been wonderful to hear them tell me how much they have enjoyed most of the books they chose for their holiday reading. It's great to hear their feedback and how they have pondered over a book after reading eg whether they have liked or disliked the story line or style of the writer's delivery and text.
