Over the past few days, we've been really proud of the way our Year 9, 10 and 11 students have approached the first round of Common Assessment Activities (CAAs). While these assessments can feel a little unfamiliar and even a bit nerve-wracking, our students have shown a great deal of maturity and a positive, growth-focused attitude. It's been encouraging to see them giving things a go, supporting one another, and treating the experience as an opportunity to learn and grow.

Our Primary team has also been hard at work over the past few weeks, with a strong focus on assessments in preparation for mid-year reporting. These assessments play an important role in informing teaching and learning, helping our teachers tailor their programmes to best support each learner as we head into the second half of the year. We're grateful for the thoughtful and intentional work that goes into this process and the dedication of our teachers to student success.

We were recently lucky to host Bob Bickerton, an incredibly talented performer who shared his passion for taonga pūoro – traditional Māori instruments – with our tamariki. The performance was not only engaging and fun, but also a rich cultural learning experience for our students. It was wonderful to see the curiosity and enjoyment on their faces as they learned about the sounds and stories of these beautiful instruments.

There's been a lot happening outside the classroom too. Students have been busy preparing for both the senior and junior cross country events coming up soon. It's been great to see many students taking part, challenging themselves, and showing support for their peers. And on Tuesday it was heartening to see both courts full of netball games, the field buzzing with soccer training, and preschoolers enjoying the space. It wasn't just the tamariki getting involved – there were plenty of whānau around too, catching up on the sidelines and supporting their kids. The atmosphere was vibrant and really captured the spirit of our kura – full of life, connection, and a strong sense of community.

Library News

What happens inside our brains when we read?

How does the science of storytelling explain the power of narratives to shape our minds? In what ways do stories make us uniquely human?

First, there's what psychologists call "transportation" or immersion—defined as "when the reader loses themselves in the story world." This mental journey allows us to temporarily leave our reality behind. Then there's "identification," which occurs "where a reader takes on the perspective and identity of a story character." This psychological phenomenon creates a profound connection where we, as readers, experience the character's emotions as if they are our own.

Stories help children (and adults) make sense of the world and themselves, supporting social and emotional learning. These effects may also extend to our attitudes toward different groups of people.

This school both in the class and in the Library have a strong culture of reading aloud to the pupils. From the Hardy Boys' series that was read to a class by teacher and headmaster Warren Iggo in the 1970s to the classic stories shown below that have stood the test of time.

Reading aloud to children of all ages is one of the most rewarding activities you can do with them. Picture books bring joy, empathy and knowledge to all of us.



On an administrative note, can you please look out for and keep track of the school library books that come home, we have about 30 books that were due back before the last school holidays. The children get their library books for 3 weeks and the chance to renew them once. All the library books are precious to us and chosen very carefully. When books aren't available for others to read because they are left at home all the time it becomes a little frustrating. I will usually email or text you to remind you once they have not been returned for a while, but please help us by returning them before the due date.

We take books back no matter how long you have had them!


A Reminder About Attendance and Wellbeing
