Esther McNaughton, Suter Educator, guided students through the exhibits, offering fascinating insights into each collection.

The highlight of the visit was a hands-on workshop inspired by the Connections jewellery exhibition. This display featured works by renowned Aotearoa artists that explored themes of cultural inheritance, personal stories, and family legacies—prompting students to reflect on their own connections to the past.



The Year 10 students recently embarked on an enriching excursion to the Nelson Museum and The Suter Gallery as part of their cross-curricular Cultural Narratives unit.

During their visit, students explored the historical context of "The Māori Tenths," with a focus on the Nelson Tenths, which highlighted a significant land dispute and trust in New Zealand's history (Social Studies).

They also engaged in observational drawing, selecting pieces from a variety of taonga, including Maori musical instruments, to deepen their understanding of cultural artifacts.

The Year 1-6 races were held on Friday 30th May, bright and early on a sunny but windy and very cold earlywinter morning.


Prior to the event, Craig had carefully tended to the tracks, with Craig doing a fantastic job of tidying the course through the forest at the back of the school.


