Kia ora e te whānau,

When a community comes together with shared intention and open hearts, something powerful happens and that spirit of kotahitanga (unity) was present in every part of our celebration. This is the true essence of Matariki remembering, reflecting, and reconnecting as one.

Te Timatanga The Beginning

Our celebration began with beautiful waiata, performed by both kaiako (teachers) and ākonga (students). The blending of voices lifted wairua and set a powerful tone for the day. These songs reminded us of our connection to each other, to our ancestors, and to the wider universe.

A deeply moving moment followed, as our senior students planted a collection of rare and native trees – generously gifted by our friends at Okay Grow. These trees are more than just greenery; they are living taonga, planted in memory of those we have lost during the past year. In this act, we honoured the past while also nurturing the future.

Ngā Mahi Activities that Connect Us

Throughout the day, ākonga participated in a wide range of activities designed to deepen their understanding and connection to te ao Māori. Each activity was an invitation to learn, to create, and to reflect.

From crafting poi and learning traditional stories, to singing waiata and exploring the stars of Matariki, our students were immersed in experiences that connected them to the whenua, to mātauranga Māori (traditional knowledge), and to their own sense of place. These moments remind us of the richness of Māori culture and how vital it is that we celebrate and preserve these traditions together.

Kai and Community Sharing and Whanaungatanga

To close the day, we gathered together as a whole school community to share kai food prepared with care and shared in the spirit of whanaungatanga (relationship and connection). There is something profoundly grounding about sitting down to eat together it reminds us of the importance of hospitality, of kindness, and of being present with one another. A special thank you to the Strange whānau for their kind donation of a sheep.

The laughter, stories, and full bellies was a beautiful way to conclude a day that honoured the stars, our ancestors, and our shared future.
