Our Primary teachers worked with Renee Jepson from Poutama Pounamu/University of Waikato through Kāhui Ako ki Mohu, exploring the important role of attachment in learning and wellbeing, and how this connects to teaching across the curriculum – particularly in mathematics. Our Secondary teachers spent the day on collaborative planning, lesson design, assessment moderation, work on Pūtake (an NZQA learning platform), and professional growth activities. This kind of dedicated time is invaluable for ensuring we are delivering the very best learning experiences for our students.

And now to acknowledge last Thursday's Lip Sync Evening - an absolute highlight of the last two weeks, both for me personally and for our kura. The creativity, commitment, and confidence our students showed on stage was inspiring - and the learning that comes from pulling together a performance like that is huge. Vocabulary Development:


Reading widely exposes students to a broader vocabulary, including mathematical terms, which can improve their understanding of math concepts.


Cognitive Skills:


Lost Property

Important Note:

Significant changes to NCEA are planned from 2028 onwards. Key proposals include:

Year 11: NCEA Level 1 replaced with a Foundational Skills Award focusing on literacy and numeracy

Years 12 & 13: New qualifications – NZ Certificate of Education (NZCE) and NZ Advanced Certificate of Education (NZACE) – replacing Levels 2 and 3

Grading: Move to marks out of 100 with letter grades

Due to these up-and-coming changes, and the very limited information that has been released by the Ministry of Education, we are unable to answer more questions than what is already publicly available. However, we are happy to focus on what 2026 will look like for our whānau members.
