The energy, enthusiasm, and community spirit on the day were fantastic, and the results are already making a visible difference. Our school grounds are beginning to take shape in a way that reflects our shared vision for the future. Manaaki Tāpoi: An Adventure in Connection

Hello, my name is Jacob, and as a Year 11 student, I recently had the chance to participate in the Manaaki Tāpoi Explore course run by Whenua Iti Outdoors during the final week of Term 3. This course is designed to celebrate and explore the importance of connecting with the natural world and others through the lens of cultural tourism.

Making Connections in Kaiteriteri

The first day was a fantastic opportunity to step outside my comfort zone. While I didn't know anyone initially, I made friends very quickly! After efficiently packing the bus and trailer, we headed straight to Kaiteriteri. Setting up our tents was a great team effort. To begin our exploration, the instructors led us on a powerful walk up to a historic site—what was once a Māori village. Reaching the top of the steep hill was rewarding, and we heard fascinating stories about the place's history, its name, and the traditions of the Māori tribes.

Next, we climbed to a beautiful lookout before returning to the beach for a unique exercise: sitting in silence for 15 minutes to reflect on our surroundings and feelings, then sharing our observations with the group. That night, I was on the first cooking team, and we were a huge success! We made pasta, which everyone declared was the best meal of the week. While the evening schedule was structured with bookwork time before an early 9 p.m. bedtime, it provided a quiet, reflective end to an action-packed day.

Exploring Natural Landmarks

The next day, we woke up bright and early at 6:30 a.m. and headed to the iconic Boulder Banks. The journey was an important lesson in patience and teamwork. Once we arrived, our group had a creative challenge to build rock towers, and our team successfully built the tallest one!

Next, we travelled to the base of the Centre of New Zealand walk. Although the pace was controlled, which made the climb take longer, it allowed us to be fully present and mindful of our ascent. Reaching the summit was a great achievement. The activity at the top—sharing a personal memory of Nelson—was a fun way to connect our stories to the local area. While the walk back had a few unexpected stops, it was all part of the unique, challenging experience.

A Relaxed Final Day and Positive Takeaway


The final full day started with a welcome 7:30 a.m. wake-up and breakfast, which gave me time for a quick, sneaky shower! The morning was calm, focused on quiet bookwork, followed by fun, active games. That evening, we attended an event at Motueka High School to support other students on the course. We helped with food prep, enjoyed a shared meal, socialized, and then watched the students receive certificates and give performances. It was a great opportunity to connect with the wider community. The course wrapped up with a final pack-up and travel back to the Whenua Iti base, where we were treated to the best burgers ever—a perfect end to the trip!

Overall, the highlight of the Manaaki Tāpoi course was definitely making new friends and sharing a week of adventure with them. The new friendships I formed made the whole experience valuable.

Wildlands by Brogen Murphy - This new book has a very novel story line - and for those that know me - I love a book with a map inside, it makes the story much easier to understand and picture in my head. The book also made me wonder if I could survive in the wilderness by myself and justifies why I carry a pocketknife and mini torch in my handbag and always keep my phone charged.

"Twenty-five years into the future, no humans are allowed in the Wildlands - a vast area in Britain where wolves, lynx and bison roam free. The only exception is a high-speed train line between London and Glasgow that crosses right through the heart of the project. Thirteen-year-old Astrid and her little sister, Indie, are onboard when their train slows to a brief, unexpected stop ... and they find themselves accidentally

left behind. Stranded in this place of astonishing natural wonders and terrible dangers, they have only a rucksack, a phone without signal - and each other. As every wrong turn takes them deeper into the Wildlands, do they have the ingenuity and determination to survive? How far would YOU go to find your way home?"

October is our month for promoting scary, mysterious, thriller and spooky stories. The Library has a display with a good selection of stories from detective to horror. We have a newly published, classic detective story from Agatha Christie with Hercule Poirot as the detective. It is regarded as one of the best of her novels. Originally published in 1926 - it proves a well written book is timeless.

"The Murder of Roger Ackroyd, with its legendary twist, changed the detective fiction genre forever. Roger Ackroyd knew too much. He knew that the woman he loved had poisoned her brutal first husband. He suspected also that someone had been blackmailing her. Now, tragically, came the news that she had taken her own life with a drug overdose. But the evening post brought Roger one last fatal scrap of information.
